## **RAF Nuneaton**

MIRA has hit the headlines in recent months because of their plans to extend their site over part of Bosworth Battlefield. They have been in the area since 1948 when they took over the disused airfield that had been RAF Nuneaton (also known as RAF Lindley) for the last few years of the war. Allied planes had begun bombing Germany in 1940 and, as the number of raids increased, along with the casualty rate,

there was a growing need for new crews. The Midlands was an ideal location for training airfields, with operational squadrons flying from the east and south of England where they had less far to travel to the European mainland. Nearby RAF Bramcote was a training airfield but by 1942, it was operating at near capacity and so a new linked airfield was created in fields to the north of Watling Street near Higham.

There was concern locally about the disruption the airfield would have once training flights began



and one particular objection came from the Bishop of Leicester. The flight path to the airfield passed directly over St Margaret's church in Stoke Golding, and there were fears that a low flying plane might clip the 120-foot high spire. After six months of negotiating, the matter was resolved and 60 feet of spire was dismantled, each brick being numbered so that it could be returned to its former position once the war was over. Stoke also acquired an RAF observation tower which still stands off the Wykin Road, owned nowadays by Terry Bottrill.

As the main training base was at Bramcote, only one hangar was constructed along with other facilities for upwards of one thousand personnel. One group of airmen, stationed at Bramcote, who may well have gone out on training from Nuneaton were Poles who had fled their country when the Nazis invaded, and who were now keen to help get them out again. The airfield's role for training bombing crews lasted about a year until June 1943 when RAF Transport Command moved in. As planning for D-day began, it became clear that air transport was going to become a crucial part of the operation, for both flying troops in and for delivering equipment and supplies. They kept the same Wellington bombers they'd used for training purposes and one captain, stationed there in 1944, complained that flying a Wellington was nothing like handling a real transport plane, as that

some of the navigational aids they were learning to use wouldn't be available when they were posted to Indo-China to fight against the Japanese.

The base was abandoned in 1946 although it remained in government hands until 1950. Much of the site is as it was back then, with a

triangle of three runways used for testing vehicles these days. The buildings were adapted by MIRA, although the old control tower was relocated to the Imperial War Museum at RAF Duxford some years ago.

## A Stoke Golding and Dadlington Miscellany

During the summer of 2018 Denis Cash gave me a call and asked to see me. He was bright, cheerful, and I had no idea he was ill until he told me. We talked about "Old Stoke" and "Dado" and he told me a little about his own interesting background. We both expressed an interest in local history and I told him I knew of several people who had collections of local historical material which I should like to see made available in some way to local people.

As I left he gave me two CDs which he said might interest me and a month or two later he asked me to call again. I did so and he gave me another five discs. I'm ashamed to say I didn't look at them in any detail until I heard the sad news that Denis had died.

To say I was astounded is an understatement and the further I looked the more astounded I became. The archives which the discs contain are a veritable Aladdin's Cave of information about our two villages, going back to the Magna Carta at least and probably beyond. I have barely scratched the surface of them yet, but know already that this is a unique and prodigious collection worthy of the highest praise and much too valuable to be left lying around in any individual's filing cabinet.

The content of the first 5 discs is divided into 108 volumes and those volumes contain 2,160 files. The remaining discs contain another 90 files, a total of 2,250, amounting to 4.5 gigabytes of information. I haven't yet counted all the photographs but already I've found around 2,000 and an index I have put together runs to 13 double-column pages, in very small print. By any standards this archive contains a colossal amount of invaluable information which must have taken years to collect.

Denis referred to many of his files as "A Stoke Golding Miscellany" and when I started to compile an index my instinct was to "tidy them up" and put them in what to me would appear to be some kind of logical order. For example, "The Papers of R.E. (Reg) Flavell" moved into one file rather than three separate files in three different volumes; all the obituaries in one file, in chronological order and the Stoke Golding files separated from the Dadlington files.

On reflection, however, I decided to leave the archive as Denis compiled, titled and presumably intended it, a Miscellany, a medley if you like, of events, people, places, stories and statistics, to dip into as you might a newly discovered treasure chest, not knowing what precious gem you might find. Perhaps a mundane "Street Signs in Stoke," an intriguing "Female Village Blacksmith," a bizarre "Goose Strangling in Dadlington 1870" or a priceless "Ancient History of Stoke Golding."

I'm currently refining the index and exploring ways in which the Miscellany might be made more widely available.

PORK CHOPS WITH SAGE AND TOMATOES INGREDIENTS 4 Pork chops (trimmed) 1tblsp. Olive Oil 1oz. Butter I clove of Garlic 1oz.(25gms.) Plain Flour 15fl. ozs. (425ml.) Chicken Stock 3fl.ozs. (75ml.) White Wine 2tsp. Tomato Puree 1tsp. Dried Sage 4 Spring Onions, peeled and sliced 3 Tomatoes, peeled and chopped	METHOD Pre-heat the oven to 160C/325F or Gas Mark 3-4 Cook for 3-4 minutes each side until well -browned. Remove the meat and place in an oven-proof gratin dish in a single layer. Heat the butter in the pan and the crushed garlic and flour and cook for one minute stirring all the time. Slowly add the stock , wine and tomato puree, and stir constantly until the sauce boils and thickens. Pour the sauce over the chops, add the sage and spring onions, cover the dish and place into the oven for 1 hour. Remove from the oven and add the tomatoes, return the dish to the oven and cook for a further 20 minutes.

Martin played my son in a wonderful Neil Simon comedy, "Barefoot in the Park," all those years ago, so I guess he must be getting into his 70's now, twenty years younger than I am. There's a nervous laugh at his end and then; "Well we were so looking forward to your wonderfully funny annual Christmas letter from your sock factory in the Midlands and ... " his voice tails off. I explain; "Oh darling - sadly I was stuck in hospital until nearly the big day itself, so there was just no time." He pauses at the end of the line, and then asks; "So what was it Beth darling?" I laugh trying to make light of it. "Can you believe it love, apparently I had pneumonia." I'm suddenly aware of a shocked silence - and then: "Oh you poor thing darling, you poor thing! I'd better let you go." I manage to persuade him, I'm OK now, but he's obviously longing to put his phone down and escape from any contagion. Mind you, I have to admit I'm always waiting for that airmail from Australia, with the photos of my oldest cousin Enid, ninety-eight last year. I want to make sure she's still with us. Thankfully there she is in her wheelchair - a mirror image of me and my daughter in my first wheelchair trip of the year, yesterday, at Dobbies. Ooh! What a comfort it is - being trundled around by someone, but I must beware - or otherwise I might truly become a poor thing! One of my newer friends called in this morning. He had just come from the Methodist's coffee morning and, at eighty-eight, is one of the most active friends I have. "So, where are you off to next John?" I discover he has a coach trip planned to Scotland and, as he so rightly says, "I'd better do it while I can. You never know how I'll be next year. My world seems to be diminishina."

Sitting here at my laptop, I can really identify with that. Our wonderful view is diminished by the mist over the fields. I can just see the shape of the sheep moving through it. The BBC News suddenly shows the world a grief-stricken Andy Murray having to accept the diminishing of his entire world, his identity. Thankfully though he gave us those wonderful years, and climbed the peaks of success, before the unexpected came.

I sit and stare at the television, before glancing at the cuttings John left me. As usual, it's another interesting 'celebrity' cutting, this time on the wonderful Dame June Whitfield - from The Guardian's Obituaries. Looking charming, in a pale blue hat and dress at Buckingham Palace, showing her CBE to the photographers, and looking totally undiminished, as if she knew all those years later, she deserves not just one column but a complete full-page. Aah...at last the sun is breaking through, maybe a gentle drive out - while we can, and before I forget A VERY HAPPY & HEALTHY NEW YEAR.

## Candles

At Higham's Carol Service in December the church was filled with lit candles and no other lights. It was very atmospheric. A brass quintet greatly added to the sense of awe and joy. All went well for me as I conducted the service, until my needing to move to the lectern to read the last lesson. The print of my bible was very small and the light in church was rather dim and I realised that I couldn't read the first chapter from John's Gospel! Luckily my wife stepped forward with an over-sized candle, stood by me, and I was able to read. As I explained to the congregation afterwards, not for the first time, she was the 'light of my life'!

I am into candles and so are we as churches. We have candles on our altars, huge Paschal candles to represent the risen Christ at Easter, small candles given to children coming for Baptism, candles in oranges at Christingle services – I could go on. My wife and I always light a candle, when one is available, when we visit cathedrals or other churches. This is to particularly remember our grandson who died aged thirteen two years ago.

Sometimes it seems good to 'do something' when words alone aren't quite enough; it's good to have a symbol or sign of what is in our hearts.

2<sup>nd</sup> February is sometimes called Candlemas – a celebration of candles. It is a day to notice the wax vapour going into the heavens, like prayer ; it's a day to particularly recognise the candle's light shining in the darkness. Candlemas is a good day to remember once again that Christ is the 'light of the world'.

The passage from John's Gospel that I was eventually able to read, thanks to candlelight, contains the following words about Jesus: "What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all

Skating on the "cut" in Stoke goes back a long time. I have a pair of skates in my garage that belonged to my aunt. She must have been skating in the early part of the 1900's. Legend tells us that she was very good.

But to more recent years. I bought my first pair of ice skates in January 1953, a few months before my 16th birthday. The cut would freeze over most winters at that time (so much then for global warming). Many people would turn out then to skate. We beginners would look up to such older skaters as Reg Jones, Bob Mayne (my aunt's

Cromack from Higham, and Frank Hall J.P. of H.J. Socks, to name but a few.

The 1960's and 1970's were possibly the two greatest decades. I remember winter 1962-63 when the ice froze with no snow, clear as a sheet of glass and one of the only

two years when we skated on Christmas Day.

But the greatest memory of all, I was amongst the first group to skate from Stoke Wharf to the Lime Kilns, an old fashioned pub at that time on the A5 road. It was to become a tradition. On a Tuesday evening we would meet at 7pm and set off about 7.30. It took about three quarters of an hour to reach the destination where we were made most welcome. The Rev. Bill Quinney was a regular member of this group. He would play the old upright piano in the bar and a good time was had by all!!

At turning out time we would make our way back to Stoke, often someone would fall through the ice, usually one of the very foolhardy or a heavyweight. I will not name names at this point!

My own daughter, Luisa, skated to the Lime Kilns in later years. On Monday 5th November, I was in London to see her skate in a synchronised skating group competition at Lee Valley Ice Rink.
