Proposed Entry under Policies for Community Infrastructure and Facilities (excluding Transport)

The village has two schools catering for its children. St Margarets for children 4+ to eleven years with a current pupil number of 222, and St Martins catering for 11 to 16. Both Schools provide education for children who reside outside the neighbourhood plan area.

St Margarets catchment area includes Dadlington and Upton as well as Stoke Golding. They also take children from outside the catchment area, currently about % of the school. In more recent years extensions have been built in 1952, 1969, 1985, 1991, 2002, 2012 and 2017 to cater for the housing growth in the village and surrounding area. Children from St Margarets primarily move on to St Martins Catholic Academy or to Redmore Academy in Hinckley.

St Martins Catholic Academy as a Roman Catholic School provides education to Roman Catholic children from South West Leicestershire as well as children from Stoke Golding. At 16 they move on to sixth form colleges within the local area

The viability of both schools is dependent on children from outside the Neighbourhood Plan Area commuting to the schools. This creates peak hour traffic/parking issues for the local community.

Schools

The village has two schools catering for its children. St Margarets for children 4+ to eleven years with a current pupil number of 222, and St Martins catering for 11 to 16. Both Schools provide education for children who reside inside and outside the neighbourhood plan area.

St Margaret's catchment area includes Fenny Drayton, Dadlington and Upton as well as Stoke Golding. They also take children from outside the catchment area, currently about 50% of the school. Extensions were built in 1952, 1969, 1985, 1991, 2002, 2012 and 2017 to cater for the housing growth in the village and surrounding area. There is no further capacity for development. It is forecasted that in future, predicting further local developments, a higher percentage will come from within the catchment area. Children from St Margarets primarily move on to St Martins Catholic Academy or to Redmore Academy in Hinckley.

St Martins Catholic Academy as a Roman Catholic School provides education to Roman Catholic children from South West Leicestershire as well as children from Stoke Golding. At 16 they move on to sixth form colleges within the local area until the school is able to establish its own sixth form provision

The viability of both schools is dependant on children from outside the Neighbourhood Plan Area commuting to the schools. This creates peak hour traffic/parking issues for the local community.

Policy 1 The Parish Council will support proposals, as appropriate, to improve and enhance facilities at St Margarets and St Martins for the benefit of the children in the community.

Policy 2 The Parish Council will, in response to development proposals, stress that unless additional educational facilities are made available outside of the catchment area of St Margarets, children from this area could only be accommodated locally by a reduction in standards ie increased class sizes.
